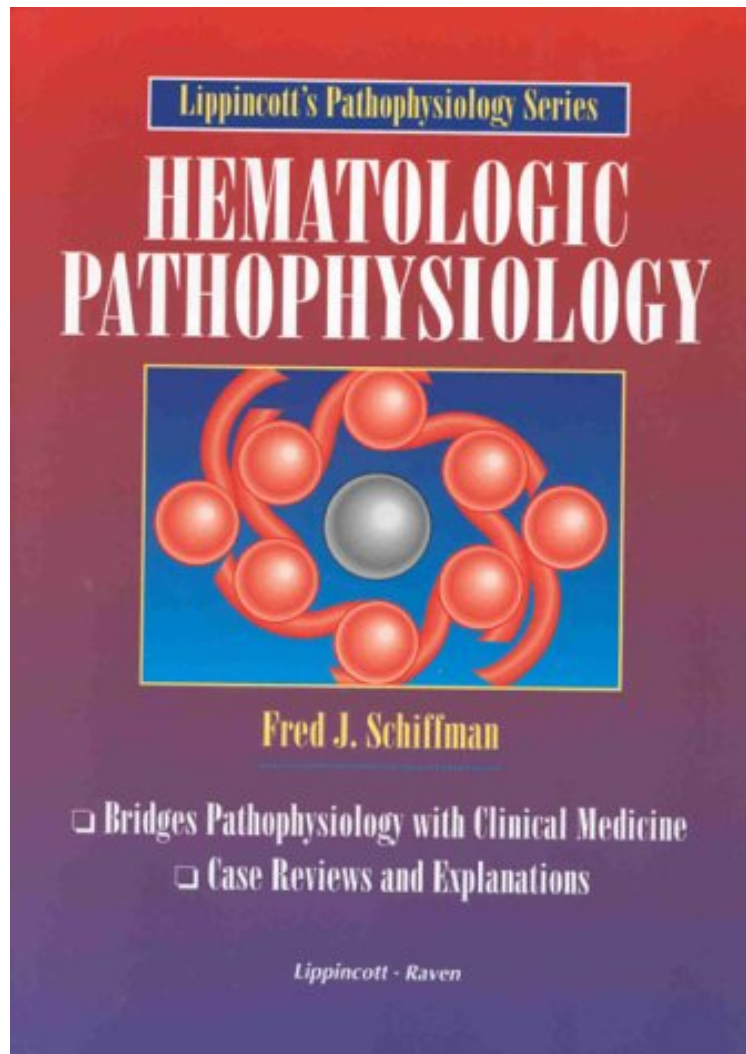

Rajuthamoi This book is a hodge-podge of chapters written at different levels without a consistent tone and without a consistent level of detail. Some chapters are thorough and clear; some are incomprehensible and seem to belong to a different textbook. Very poorly edited! The platelet chapter is truly a mess, and its diagrams are confusing. There is an exhaustive discussion of minor

details (R:Co, for instance), but the discussion of hematologic malignancies is thoroughly inadequate. You are much better off simply reading Robbins' Pathologic Basis of Disease chapters on hematology and white blood cells. Lippincott's normally puts out truly exceptional books for med students, but this is an exception to their success. And its treatment of white blood was inadequate to walk away with a good grasp of immunology. The diagrams occasionally made topics even more difficult to understand -probably not what they were intended to do.All in all its a good primary text for a haemeatology unit, but you will definately need a histo atlas to go with it. Boxed case-problems challenge the student to apply key hematologic principles in a variety of clinical decisions. Numerous two-color drawings and schematics illustrate all essential concepts, and subheads, color highlights, and tables aid in comprehension and review.
